Points from the Pavilion

IT is interesting to recall that our Swedish visitors have a brilliant tradition in World soccer. Their outstanding achievement was in reaching this year's final of the World Cup. You will recall that tremendous moment when the victorious Brazilians carried the flag of Sweden round the Stockholm Stadium after they had defeated the home country by 5 goals to 2.

For Sweden it was their first defeat at home for three years, which is quite a notable record in itself. Although beaten by Brazil they did much better than in the 1950 tournament, in which there was a six-goal margin between the teams.

By winning the Silver Medals as the Finalists, they achieved their best performance in the World Cup. Apparently several of the well-known internationals are expected at Tynecastle to-night. That star of all the Swedish half-backs, Sigvard Parling, is mentioned as a possible candidate. He has the great personal record, I believe, of having gained 29 "caps."

For their first visit to Tynecastle Djurgardens will be carrying the torch for their country's prestige against the Scottish champions and that is why our welcome to them is all the warmer.

Our visitors, when they were champions of Sweden, were drawn against Hibernian F.C. in the first post-war European Cup tournament. Because the Swedish season was closed the ties were played in Scotland, the Hibernians winning both games; 3-1 at Firhill Park, and 1-0 at Easter Road.

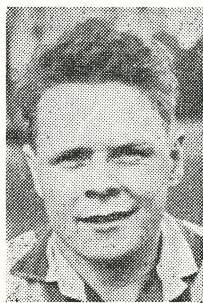

"The hospitality shown to us during our Edinburgh visit has been typically Scottish," said Mr. Pat Murray, the Manager of the South African team at Tynecastle. "We changed our plans and travelled by air instead of by train to see as much of Edinburgh and Scotland in the brief spell allotted to us by our commitments. It was pleasant to arrive in the sunlight of the Scottish Capital after the foggy conditions of London," he said.

"Britain has really been truly remarkably generous in her hospitality towards us," said Mr. Murray. "We have been made to feel really at home since we arrived on these shores on board the R.M.S. 'Carnarvon Castle,' on Friday, 12th September."

PLAYED GOOD FOOTBALL

The results of their tour had not been so good, but they played good football.

Our friends from the Union have been delighted with their test matches or what we call internationals. Their victory against Northern Ireland, which they won 5—2; they forced a draw with the pick of England's Amateurs; against Wolverhampton and Chelsea they lost by the narrow margin of a goal. Their record, including the Tynecastle game, is played 14, won 6, lost 5, and drawn 3.

Swedens' Soccer Fame

This is an appropriate occasion to recall Sweden's part in the final of the World Cup last summer when they lost to Brazil 5-2.

The game opened on a dramatic note and certainly most encouraging for Sweden when Ledidholm scored in the 4th minute. Brazil struck back with a goal by Vava in the 8th minute. The Swedish defence was then hard pressed to keep those dazzling Brazilian forwards out. They took the lead in the 30th minute with a replica of the first goal, Vava again finishing off a move by right-winger Garrincha.

Though a goal down at the interval the Swedes were not out of the game and their attack looked dangerous, but those little, stocky men from Brazil took a firm grip on the game and went further ahead with a goal by 17-year old Pele, the inside-left. This came in the 9th minute of the second half and in the 22nd minute Zagallo cut into the goalmouth to score the fourth. Sweden got their second goal through centre-forward Simonsson in the 79th minute, but when the final whistle had almost sounded Pele headed a fifth goal for Brazil.

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Our Visitors

. . . . Djurgardens

DJURGARDENS is one of the oldest and most well-known of Swedish clubs. It was founded on 12th March, 1891, under an old oak tree on a part of Stockholm called "Djurgarden," previously well-known as the royal hunting grounds. The word "Djurgarden" means "Zoo." The oak was adapted as the symbol of the club, that has been famous in all kinds of sports.

In fact more than 300 Swedish Championships have been won in different sports. The Club has the following sections—table-tennis, bowling, boxing, wrestling, curling, football, ice-hockey, ski-ing, cross-country walking and handball. There is also a ladies' section.

Among members having made headlines all over the world are the former professional Swedish and European heavyweight boxing champion, Olle Tandberg, once on fourth place in the Rings ranking list; the ski-jumper, Dan Netsell, who jumped 137 metres on skis and broke the world record; Hans Jeppson, the world's most expensive soccer player, when he received 190,000 U.S. dollars for a three year's contract with Naples in Italy, 1952; and finally, Sigvard Parling, left half-back in our actual soccer team, who was considered to be the best left wing-half-back during this last World's Cup tournament.

From 1900-1921 the club was particularly strong in soccer, but after 1925 we had a weak period, and even descended to the Fourth Division. We were up on top in 1937-38, but after 1945 we have kept our position in the First League and are considered to be one of the three big Swedish teams. We have in fact never ended worse than fourth in the last seven years. We were Champions in 1955.

The average crowds in the league games is between 16,000-20,000, but sometimes, especially in the derbies against AIK, the other local team, we have bigger crowds. We have the Swedish crowd record for a league match, 42,504. The home ground of the club is the old Olympic Stadium of 1912 that can hold 28,000 people and so far is the only Stadium with a floodlight installation. Due to the rules of the Federation we have to play half of our home games in the F.A. Stadium.

The club has a very good international reputation and is the only Swedish team that can rival with the

Austrian and Yugoslavian globe-trotters. We have played in 34 countries since the second world war. We have played 110 games abroad during this time, having won 64, drew 20, and lost only 26, with a goal average of 329-172.

We were the first European team to be invited to the U.S.A. after the war and also the first Western team to be invited to Russia. We also hold a record in Moscow, being the only one of 28 visiting teams from 21 different countries not to be beaten by the Russian champions, Spartak Moscow. We managed a very well deserved 1-1.

Another highlight in our history was when, celebrating our 60th anniversary, we managed to beat in 1951, before 40,000 spectators, the combined professional Swedish team with all its Italian stars by 3-1.

The club colours are dark and light blue striped blouses and dark blue trousers and red stockings. The dress has been specially prepared in Spain for us.

In 1955 we played in the European Cup. We should have played at Chelsea but as this team was forbidden to start by the League, we—though qualified for the next round—accepted to play the Polish champions Gwardia. After a 0-0 draw in Stockholm we beat them 4-1 in Warsaw. In the next round we had to meet the Hibernian club of Edinburgh. Due to the lateness of the season we had to play both games in Scotland. We lost the first game 1-3 at Firhill Park, Glasgow, after a splendid game, where our stopper was unlucky to score twice against his own team. In Edinburgh we lost 1-0 on a much discussed penalty before 38,000 spectators.

This season we have so far played 41 games and we have won 27, drew 9, and lost only 5. The goal average is 126-44.

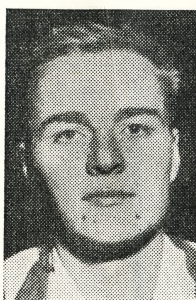

Arne Arvidsson, Goalkeeper, has been with the club for five years. Has now 5 A-caps and 7 B-caps. Is considered to be the best and most regular goalkeeper of Sweden. Very seldom makes mistakes, strong, and has plenty of confidence. Was champion with the team in 1955. He is a salesman.

Hans Mild is an all-round player, who has played inside-forward, centre, wing-half, centre-half and now finally right back. He is a youngster, very strong and with a good kick. Is a reserve in the national A-team. He is also one of the best Swedish ice hockey players, champion with the club last year and in the national team. He is studying to be an engineer.

Stig Gustafsson is 29 years old, the only player not capped. He is a born fighter and never gives up. Hard and very fast he has had very good games against such famous wingers as Stanley Matthews (whom he met in South Africa) and the Spanish winger Tejada. Works in a printing shop.

Olle Hellström is 20 years old, he is a right-half back and is also the captain

of the National junior team, where he played 10 times. A strong, elegant player, almost indefatigable and with much speed in his attacking. One of the coming A-caps. He is a plumber.

Lars Broström, Centre-Half, a sturdy boy about 190 cm. with about 90 kilos to put behind his tackling. He is one

of the fastest Swedish players and practically impossible to beat in a sprint. He has had a brilliant season and qualified for the A-team twice and twice for the B-team. Got injured a month ago but is on the way back now. He is a driver.

Sigvard Parling, an engineer and 29 years old. He played in the Swedish World Cup team and was considered to be the most consistent Swede and also the best left-half back of the tournament. He has 29 A-caps and 2 B-caps and has had more than 300 games in the Djurgarden A-team. Extremely hard and technical and a terrific worker. Is also an international in the Swedish winter sport Bandy, where he is goalkeeper. Champion with the team in 1955.

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John Eriksson, Centre-Forward, is 29 years old. He has 11 A-caps and 2 B-caps. He is a physically strong fellow always having a tussle with the centre-half, is a deadly shot with both feet and dangerous with the head. He works as foreman in a stockyard. Champion with the team in 1955.

Birger Eklund is 28 years old, another veteran and a most intelligent player. He has 3 A-caps and 2 B-caps. Has a powerful shot and plays a nice, clean passing game, always on the move. He owns a business for plastic materials. Champion with the team in 1955.

Gösta Sandberg is still only 26 years of age but has 42 A-caps and 2 B-caps. He was in the Olympic Team in 1952. A fast and dangerous winger with a strong shot. Is playing his 300th game in the A-team against Hearts in Edinburgh. He sacrificed his chance of being in the World Cup team by saying no to the selectors because he wanted to help the ice-hockey team of the club. He was the one who scored the deciding goal for the title. He has a paint shop business.

Ingvar Frank, Full Back, is 23 years of age. He has not yet earned his spurs but is very promising.

Hans Tvilling is 30 years old, one of the veterans of the A-team where he has played 282 times. He has 5 A-caps. He plays both wing-half and inside-forward, is a good technician. Is also a Swedish champion both in ice-hockey and football; even world's champion in ice-hockey.

Ake Grybb is a talented youngster, only 22 years of age, who is gaining in experience every year. Regularly at inside-forward he has also proved to be an excellent wing-half. He made his first international appearance in 1955 when he played in Glasgow against Hibernians in the European Cup, when Djurgarden lost 3-1 after a brilliant game.

Karl-Erik Isaksson is also a coming man, plays centre-half or full back. He played some games in this league and proved very promising.

Gösta Löfgren, Inside Right, is one of the best known Swedish stars. He has been borrowed for this trip, belonging to Motala A.I.F. He has 37 A-caps as an inside-forward. He also played one match in the World's Cup team. He is 35 years of age, very experienced, has a good strategical eye and is a deadly shot.

Arne Larsson, Centre-Half or Wing-Half, once belonged to the club when the title was won in 1955. He then moved to a little second division team in the north of Sweden and has played very regularly for a long time. He has 5 A-caps.

One more Player is going to follow the team but has not been selected at the moment. The club is trying to find another star player, as the original right wing of the team have had to call off due to their jobs. The first choice will be **Sylve Bengtsson** as outside-right. He has 37 A-caps.
